# Youth and Young Adult Violence Reduction Activity

- July 2006 City Council endorses the Keeping our Kids Safe Violence Prevention Network Action Plan
- November 2010 Convened the Mayor's Task Force on Teenage and Young Adult Violence Reduction
- August 2011 The South Morrison Family Education Center opens
- September 2011 The Mayor's Task Force on Teenage and Young Adult Violence Reduction presents Final Report to City Council
- September 2013 City Receives a three-year grant from the Office of Juvenile and Justice Delinquency Prevention Funds to support the Targeted Outreach Program

- March 2014 City Council agrees to establish the Youth and Gang Violence Prevention Initiative
- June 2014 The Summer Training and Enrichment Program starts
- August 2014 The Cal Ripken Field/TowneBank Athletic Park opens
- January 2015 NNPD Introduces the C.R.I.M.E. Initiative to City Council
- June 2015 The City awards community based organizations to deliver Youth Violence and Gang Prevention Services (RFP 2015-5266-0208)
- June 2015 NNPS hosts the Summer Program for Arts, Recreation and Knowledge


- October 2016 VML presents the City with the 2016 Innovation Award for Public Safety for the Summer Training and Enrichment Program


### Homicides (2017-2022)



Murder, Rape = count of victims, all others = count of offense




### Shootings (2017-2022)

# HB 422 - Youth and Gang Violence Prevention Fund and Intervention Program

- Established the Youth and Gang Violence Prevention Grant Fund and Program
- The fund and program is administered by the Department of Criminal Justice Services for the purpose of awarding grants to the Cities of Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Portsmouth, Richmond, and Roanoke to perform community assessments for youth and gang violence prevention
- Grants were awarded in the amount of \$25,000 to fund and perform an assessment



### **Community Assessment Survey**

 Objective - To better understand the scope, root causes, and effects of violence in our communities. Violence prevention and intervention efforts hinge on identifying risk and protective factors and determining when they emerge in the course of development, resulting in adverse community impact



### **Perceptions of Safety**

 Most residents feel very or pretty safe in their neighborhoods during the day, but they feel less safe at night

 Young people and Black and Hispanic respondents feel less safe, and about a third of respondents report that they feel less safe than three years ago





Gun violence is a national crisis that cities and counties of all sizes have struggled with for decades. The City of Newport News is taking a community-based approach to provide immediate interventions and long-term prevention strategies that address the issue and save lives.

We began by partnering with the Center for Crime, Equity, and Justice Research and Policy at Christopher Newport University (CNU) to release a Community Assessment Survey. The goal of the survey was to understand the most pressing concerns around safety, the root causes of violence, and the effects of crime in the city.

Newport News also launched a competitive application process to fund community-based organizations that offer programs, initiatives, and strategies that create change. After a thorough review process, 19 applications were funded for a total investment of \$1,786,551. Programs will begin immediately and run through June 30, 2023.

Through the Gun Violence Intervention Program, Newport News is supporting innovative and technology-based prevention, intervention, enforcement, and re-entry strategies. The community-based programs we are helping launch and expand bring nonprofit organizations, businesses, groups, residents, law enforcement agencies, and countless others together to create transformational and sustainable change.

#### About Our Effort

Gun violence is a nationwide problem. The City of Newport News is committed to addressing this issue by creating a city and region where residents have the support and opportunities they need to thrive. Our goal is to identify issues impacting our city and then invest in community based organizations that address the concerns.

We are adopting a two-phased approach

- Comprehensive Gun Violence and Community Safety Assessment. We are working with the Center
  for Crime, Equity, and Justice Research and Policy at Christopher Newport University (CNU) to conduct
  a comprehensive Cun Violence Community Assessment. Our findings will help city leaders and the
  public understand the most pressing concerns around safety, as well as the root causes and effects of
  violence in the community. The preliminary results were shared with the city earlier this summer;
   CNU will release the final report over the next flow weeks.
- Grants to Community Organizations: The City of Newport News launched a grant program to offer funding to qualified community-based organizations that present solutions to reduce gun violence.
   We are currently reviewing grant applications and will announce the organizations that received funding in late summer 2022.

#### Engagement with Community Organizations

We will invest in community-based organizations that demonstrate the capacity to create safe and stronge neighborhoods. Examples of solutions include but are not limited to:

- . Connecting those at high risk for violence to education, employment, and housing services
- Providing mentoring, trauma-informed services and mental health supports to individuals impacted by gun violence
- Deterring individuals at high risk for violence from engaging in gun violence
- . Helping individuals at high risk for violence resolve potentially violent disputes before they occur



### **Evaluation and Selection**

#### FY23 GUN VIOLENCE INTERVENTION PROGRAM (GVIP) Proposal Evaluation

The City of Newport News has been awarded a grant from the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) for the Virginia Gun Violence Intervention Program (GVIP). The primary purpose is to support the implementation of strategies that will result in reduced gun violence in local communities. This will be done by using evidence-based programming or promising practices that have been proven effective in reducing gun violence. The specific focus on interrupting cycles of violence among those individuals at highest risk for perpetrating gun violence or being a victim of gun violence.

All projects should be community-based with a focus on at least one of two key elements: prevention and intervention. These are defined as:

Prevention - Solutions that keep youth and young adults from entering or reentering the cycle of violence. Prevention involves efforts to prevent escalation by assisting individuals at an increased risk of violence or exhibiting early signs (or repeated signs) of violent behavior.

Intervention - Programs and policies that assist youth and young adults, as well as their families, that have been impacted by violence and will reduce their risk levels of repeat exposure or recidivism.

Programs and practices are considered to be evidence-based when their effectiveness has been demonstrated by data-driven evidence (generally obtained by one or more outcome evaluations) and peerreviewed research literature.

Projects should support one of the following goals and objectives:

- Increased communication, coordination, and collaboration amongst city departments, communitybased organizations, businesses, and other key stakeholders.
- · Reduction in the incidents of gun violence amongst youth and young adults between the ages of 13 and 24 through the implementation of innovative and technology-based prevention, intervention, enforcement, and re-entry strategies.
- · Enhance and/or expand access to mental health services, education, and interventions that prevent and reduce violence.
- · Decrease in the barriers (i.e., education, employment, and housing) to the successful reintegration of youth and young adults returning to the community from a secure juvenile detention facility.
- · Increase in community education, awareness, and engagement around gun violence reduction and its impact on individuals, families, neighborhoods, and broader communities.

Proposals will be reviewed using the following criteria:

- . Effectiveness the extent to which the project is likely to achieve the proposed program's goals and outcomes based on identified metrics
- . Reach the number of youth served and the area(s) of the City where it will be implemented.
- Replicability the extent to which the program could be implemented in other locations of the
- . Connection to Identified Need the extent to which the project addresses a need identified in the Community Assessment and risk factors as identified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)






### Alignment for Results
